Discuss privacy implications of real-time sharing, ensure location services are off, and monitor content shared.
X (formerly Twitter)	Microblogging platform for news, opinions, and social interaction.	Exposure to hate speech, misinformation, cyberbullying, and adult content due to less stringent moderation [1].	Enable content filters, block and report inappropriate accounts, and discuss critical media literacy.
